ROLL CALL

Mayor Joe convened the Regular Meeting of the South Pasadena Joint City Council/Redevelopment Successor Agency (Agency)/Public Financing Authority (Authority) at 7:40 p.m.

Interim Chief Deputy City Clerk Kilby called the roll. Present were City Councilmembers/Agency/Authority Members Cacciotti, Khubesrian, and Schneider; Mayor Pro Tem/Agency/Authority Vice Chair Mahmud; and Mayor/Agency/Authority Chair Joe.

Absent: None.

Councilmember Schneider presented the invocation.

1. CLOSED SESSION ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mayor Joe called the Closed Session of the Regular Meeting of the City Council of June 3, 2015, to order at 6:30 p.m., and all Councilmembers were present, with Councilmember Cacciotti arriving at 6:48 p.m. The Meeting convened into Closed Session to discuss the following items as listed on the Closed Session Regular Meeting Agenda:

City Attorney Highsmith announced that the City Council met in Closed Session with legal counsel regarding a matter of pending litigation; direction was provided to legal counsel. The City Council also met in Closed Session regarding a matter of potential initiation of litigation; no action was taken. In addition the City Council met in Closed Session to provide a performance evaluation of the City Attorney; direction was provided to the City Attorney.

2. PRESENTATION OF A CERTIFICATE OF APPRECIATION TO BILL BOGAARD, FORMER MAYOR, CITY OF PASADENA, FOR SERVING FOUR MAYORAL TERMS AND OVER 16 YEARS OF DEDICATION AND COMMITMENT TO ENHANCE THE CITIES OF PASADENA AND SOUTH PASADENA AND THE SAN GABRIEL VALLEY

Mayor Joe invited Bill Bogaard, Former Mayor, City of Pasadena (Pasadena), and his wife, Claire Bogaard, to join him at the podium. Mayor Joe stated that Bill Bogaard had recently completed his fourth term as Mayor of Pasadena and described some of his accomplishments, professional activities, and recognitions. Mayor Joe described assistance provided to the City of South Pasadena (City) by both Bill and Claire Bogaard. Mayor Joe said Former Mayor Bogaard is the epitome of what a Mayor should be, truly a class act and a gentleman who leads with dignity. City Councilmembers made remarks describing their relationship with Former Mayor Bogaard and expressed sincere appreciation to him.

Mayor Joe presented a Certificate of Appreciation to Former Mayor Bogaard for serving four Mayoral terms and over 16 years of dedication and commitment to enhance the Cities of Pasadena, South Pasadena, and the San Gabriel Valley. He presented commemorative coins to both Former Mayor Bogaard and Mrs. Bogaard. In addition, a bouquet of flowers was presented to Mrs. Bogaard.

A recess for refreshments in honor of Former Mayor Bogaard was taken at 7:59 p.m.

Mayor Joe reconvened the City Council Meeting at 8:10 p.m.

3. ANNOUNCEMENT OF 5TH GRADE WINNERS OF THE FESTIVAL OF BALLOONS 4TH OF JULY POSTER CONTEST DEPICTING THE THEME "SPECIAL OLYMPICS"

Prior to tonight's Closed Session Meeting, the City Council reviewed the Festival of Balloons 4th of July Poster Contest finalist entries and voted on 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners. Joe Payne, Chair, Festival of Balloons 4th of July Committee, described the contest depicting the "Special Olympics" theme and announced the winners. Chair Payne invited all to attend the 4th of July festivities.

4. PRESENTATION OF A CERTIFICATE OF APPRECIATION TO ORCHARD SUPPLY HARDWARE FOR GENEROUS DONATIONS TO THE SOUTH PASADENA COMMUNITY GARDEN

Mayor Joe presented a Certificate of Appreciation to Jim Fox, Store Manager, and Steve Standard, Neighbors Helping Neighbors, of Orchard Supply Hardware, for generous donations to the South Pasadena Community Garden. Store Manager Fox made remarks.

5. COUNCILMEMBERS' COMMENTS

Councilmember Schneider requested that an item be added to a future City Council Meeting Agenda to reconsider the City's noise regulations for a minor clarification to ensure that noise restrictions are in place for recognized City holidays, seconded by Councilmember Cacciotti. Councilmember Schneider announced the following: 1) His attendance at a presentation on May 27, 2015, made by Judy Chu, Congresswoman, 27th Congressional District, to Sophia and Hannah Hathaway, South Pasadena Residents, who received the 2015 Congressional Award Silver and Bronze Medals; and 2) His participation in a recent tour of the Nature Park (Park) with Public Works employees to assess needs of the Park, e.g., removal of dead trees, identification of areas in need of mulch. He reported that the Park is doing well and provided directions to members of the public who would like to visit the Park.

Councilmember Khubesrian reported on her efforts on behalf of the City in a new endeavor, "Beyond the 710 – Moving Forward." The City is working with the Connected

Cities and Communities, which includes the Cities of Glendale, La Cañada Flintridge, Pasadena, Sierra Madre, and South Pasadena, with support from other consultants and organizations. Councilmember Khubesrian reported and displayed PowerPoint slides on the following events: 1) A press conference held on May 28, 2015, to launch a “New Initiative for Mobility and Community,” to bring a better transportation solution to the region rather than a destructive tunnel concept or ineffective singular-mode strategies; and 2) Pasadena’s CicLAvia Event.

Councilmember Cacciotti announced his attendance at the following events: 1) A dedication ceremony held on May 27, 2015, for the Eddie Park Bridge rebuilt by Girl Scout Troop 3161, illustrated with photographs; and 2) The opening of the Metro Gold Line Foothill Extension Construction Authority Operations Campus, a maintenance facility located in the City of Monrovia that will provide new Gold Line trains that will travel the 11.5-mile extension from Pasadena to Azusa. He stated that he is the representative on the Metro Gold Line Phase II Joint Powers Authority. He said that Citrus College in Azusa has almost 20,000 students, Azusa Pacific University has the same number or more, and that the Gold Line could serve these students and faculty. He remarked that as the City’s representative on the South Coast Air Quality Management District, he travels to 35 cities. He said he has now traveled to six cities without using his automobile. He displayed a flyer advertising the annual Lawn Mower Exchange Program and described upcoming events. Councilmember Cacciotti reported that the South Pasadena Educational Foundation held its annual Parti Gras fundraiser at the Arroyo Seco Golf Course (Golf Course). He acknowledged the contribution the City makes to this event each year due to significant lost revenues when the site is unavailable to golfers. Referring to a financial report he received on the Golf Course, he said that substantial revenues are now being received by the City. He expressed concerns about the Golf Shop, which is returning less than it costs to maintain it. He requested a meeting with staff to review this situation.

Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud reminded residents that the last open house for the State Route 710 (SR-710) North Study Draft Environmental Impact Report/Environmental Impact Statement (Draft EIR/EIS) will be held on June 20, 2015, at D.W. Griffith Middle School on June 20, 2015, in East Los Angeles. She said comments are due July 6, 2015, and she urged residents to submit comments on the Draft EIR/EIS. She expressed appreciation to those who attended and made possible the City’s annual Memorial Day Commemoration at the War Memorial Building and described the program.

Mayor Joe reported and displayed PowerPoint slides on the following: 1) The South Pasadena Public Library’s (Library) free Summer Reading Program, asking Director of Library, Arts, and Culture Fjeldsted to come to the podium to describe the program whereby children read to a dog; and 2) The City’s openings on the Animal Commission, Youth Commission, and Renewable Energy Council. He urged residents to apply through the City Clerk’s Office.

6. CITY MANAGER COMMUNICATIONS

City Manager Gonzalez reported and displayed PowerPoint slides on the following events: 1) The upcoming Relay For Life fundraiser for the American Cancer Society, which will be held August 22, 2015, at Oneonta Congregational Church; and 2) A free movie, "Big Hero Six," on June 11, 2015, at Garfield Park.

7. REORDERING OF AND ADDITIONS TO THE AGENDA

Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud requested that Item No. 16 be taken before Item No. 15 as there were members of the public in attendance specifically for Item No. 16. Without opposition, this request was approved by Mayor Joe.

Mayor Joe opened the Public Comments section.

James Ross, Account Manager, Ygrene Energy, said he represents a commercial and residential Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) company that provides clean energy financing for water reduction measures. The company is financing grey water systems, low-flow valve systems, hardscape, and synthetic lawns. He provided information to the City Council and requested that an item be placed on a future City Council Meeting Agenda.

Jonathan Kroncke, South Pasadena Resident, submitted to the City Council a copy of a case summary for a probate case that involves sale of a property at 1524 Ramona Avenue. He said Holy Family Church is currently bidding on the property and that the Church has promised the City that it would not expand its school or church facilities. He urged the City to investigate and monitor the bid and sale process of the property as this may become a zoning issue.

There being no additional speakers, Mayor Joe closed the Public Comments section.

ACTION/DISCUSSION**13. ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION APPROVING THE FISCAL YEAR 2015-16 ENGINEER'S REPORT DECLARING THE CITY'S INTENTION TO PROVIDE FOR AN ANNUAL LEVY AND COLLECTION OF ASSESSMENTS AND SETTING A DATE AND TIME FOR A PUBLIC HEARING**

Public Works Director Toor presented the staff report and responded to City Councilmembers' questions. He said that the revenues from assessments do not cover the expenses for lighting and landscaping and that the General Fund is subsidizing this work every year. He said there are no reserves to utilize during emergencies.

Mayor Joe opened the Public Comments section.

There being no speakers, Mayor Joe closed the Public Comments section.

MOTION: M/S Cacciotti/Mahmud to: 1) Adopt **Resolution No. 7399** approving the Fiscal Year (FY) 2015-16 Engineer's Report declaring the City's intention to provide for

an annual levy and collection of assessments, entitled A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA, DECLARING ITS INTENTION TO PROVIDE AN ANNUAL LEVY AND COLLECTION OF ASSESSMENTS FOR CERTAIN MAINTENANCE IN AN EXISTING DISTRICT, PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF DIVISION 15, PART 2 OF THE STREETS AND HIGHWAYS CODE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA AND SETTING A TIME AND PLACE FOR A PUBLIC HEARING; and 2) Set a time and place for a Public Hearing for the FY 2015-16 Lighting and Landscaping Maintenance District (LLMD). By roll call vote, the motion passed unanimously. Absent: None.

14. DIRECTION REGARDING LIBRARY SPECIAL TAX RENEWAL OPTIONS

Director of Library, Arts, and Culture Fjeldsted presented the staff report, accompanied by a PowerPoint presentation. He recommended placing a Library Special Tax Measure (Measure) on the November 3, 2015, General Municipal Election ballot to ask voters to consider renewing the Library Special Tax. He presented the recommendations of the Measure L Committee and the Library Board of Trustees (LBT) for the terms of the renewal. Director of Library, Arts, and Culture Fjeldsted and City Attorney Highsmith responded to questions.

Mayor Joe opened the Public Comments section.

Ann Messana, President, Friends of the South Pasadena Public Library, and Member, Measure L Committee, said the Library is the focal point of the community, providing 57 hours a week of free access to all patrons. She said stagnant funding has not allowed the Library to keep up with technological advances and it is losing ground every year.

Ed Pearson, President, LBT, said Library personnel costs are anticipated to increase by 5.7% in the Fiscal Year (FY) 2015-16 Budget. If this increase is taken from the operations and maintenance budget, it turns into a 17.5% reduction to that budget. The operations and maintenance budget is \$314,000 for the FY 2015-16; \$230,000 of that is supplied by Measure L funds. This is 40% of the books, periodicals, and electronic databases budget.

There being no additional speakers, Mayor Joe closed the Public Comments section.

Questions and discussion followed.

MOTION: M/S Cacciotti/Mahmud to: 1) Approve a Measure to be included on the November 3, 2015, General Municipal Election ballot to place a question asking voters about renewing the existing Library Special Tax in accordance with recommendations of the Measure L Committee and the general consensus of the Library Board of Trustees: a) Increase the rates by 33 1/3% for the first year but convey to voters the actual increase in dollars, which is minimal, and not as a percentage increase, b) Include an additional

Consumer Price Index (CPI) factor for years two (2) through seven (7), and c) Extend the tax for seven (7) years from July 1, 2016, until June 30, 2023; 2) Request of the Los Angeles County Registrar Recorder/County Clerk that the Measure be named "Measure L," with a second choice of "Measure LL," and a third choice of "Measure B"; and 3) Direct staff to return at the June 17, 2015, City Council Meeting with a resolution calling the November 3, 2015 General Municipal Election, to include placing the question of renewing the existing Library Special Tax with the provisions noted above, and including all resolutions pertinent to placing a measure on the ballot. An amendment was proposed by Mayor Joe and approved by the maker and seconder of the motion to direct staff to return with a prioritized list of items needed by the Library as detailed in the staff report that could be obtained with the additional funds if the Measure passes. By roll call vote, the motion passed unanimously. Absent: None.

As the City Council Liaison to the LBT, Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud acknowledged the efforts of the LBT and the many Library volunteers. She said that even with the increase from Measure L the Library is still underfunded, and she urged members of the Measure L Committee to brainstorm on how to address this. She recommended developing two lists: 1) Projects that could be completed with the increased revenue; and 2) Everything that residents have expressed a desire for that can't be attained to show the gap. Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud said the Library is not functioning as a 21st century library, which is what the residents deserve.

16. INPUT REGARDING THE 2016 SAN GABRIEL VALLEY GOLDEN STREETS FESTIVAL

Principal Management Analyst Lin presented the staff report, accompanied by PowerPoint slides. In spring 2014, she said the City, in partnership with Bike San Gabriel Valley (BikeSGV), was awarded a \$390,600 grant from the Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) for an Open Streets event in spring 2016 traversing approximately 18.5 miles and coinciding with the opening of Metro's Gold Line Foothill extension to Azusa. She said input is needed on the route, preferred weekend day, blackout dates, and the preferred time for the event. She responded to City Councilmembers' questions.

Mayor Joe invited Police Captain Solinsky to provide input from the Police Department on the three proposed options. Police Captain Solinsky indicated that the Police Department supports Route 3, which is between the South Pasadena Gold Line Station and Garfield Park. The other routes involved Mission Street, Fair Oaks Avenue, Garfield Avenue, Huntington Drive and major intersections. He responded to questions.

Mayor Joe opened the Public Comments section.

Wes Reutimann, Project Director, BikeSGV, said his organization is working with the City and other San Gabriel Valley cities to organize the event. He stated that this is a wonderful opportunity for residents to experience public transportation, especially with a ballot measure related to transportation being proposed for fall 2016. He said it is

recommended that any alignment be routed through the business areas. He responded to questions.

There being no additional speakers, Mayor Joe closed the Public Comments section.

Project Director Reutimann asked to speak again, and without opposition, Mayor Joe reopened the Public Comments section.

In response to Councilmember Schneider's question, Project Director Reutimann stated that Metro does not want to provide free passes during events of this type as the public needs to learn how to utilize the transportation system.

Mayor Joe reclosed the Public Comments section.

The following recommendations were provided by the City Council:

Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud recommended that Sunday be selected as the preferred weekend day for consistency with other similar events. She suggested the following blackout dates: Mother's Day; Father's Day, Easter, and any other significant religious holidays. She favored Route 2 (South Pasadena Mission Street Gold Line Station to Garfield Avenue to Huntington Drive).

Mayor Joe recommended that Principal Management Analyst Lin brief the Parks and Recreation Commission and the Public Safety Commission on the event.

Councilmember Cacciotti recommended that Sunday be selected, and that an 8:00 a.m. or 9:00 a.m. start time would be satisfactory. If the Cities of Alhambra and San Marino are not participating, Councilmember Cacciotti recommended contacting the City of Pasadena and investigate a north route, Mission Street to Fair Oaks Avenue to Glenarm Street, to Raymond Street, and to the Fillmore or Del Mar Gold Line Stations, by June 15, 2015. He also asked that a route be investigated from the South Pasadena Mission Street Gold Line Station west on Mission Street to Orange Grove Avenue to Columbia Street or other street north to Pasadena.

Mayor Joe requested that Item No. 17, Report on Financial Policies, be presented next as members of the public would like to make public comment. Without opposition, the request was approved by City Council.

REPORTS

17. REPORT ON FINANCIAL POLICIES

Finance Director Batt presented the staff report, stating that after the City of Pasadena experienced a major embezzlement scandal, questions arose about the City's internal

control processes. He outlined the City's internal processes and auditing reviews and responded to Councilmembers' questions.

Mayor Joe opened the Public Comments section.

Gary Pia, City Treasurer, stated he is happy to let the public and Elected Officials know the stewardship system that the City has in regard to funds received, spent, and invested. He said the City has a three-pronged approach: the Finance Director, who is responsible for the day-to-day operations; a five-member Finance Committee that acts as a financial think tank and watch dog; and the elected City Treasurer, who is accountable to the citizens. In regard to the renewal of the Library Special Tax, he said that in 1994, when the tax was first approved, "we were using Windows 3.0. We were five years from a commercial Wi-Fi standard, and 13 years from the first iPhone. I think they need funding."

Carrie Adrian, Chair, Finance Committee, stated she has personally been involved in working with the Finance Department to implement sound internal controls. She said she feels comfortable with what the City is doing. She participated in recent interviews for selecting an auditing firm, and she said one of the major achievements over the years was to consider only firms that specialize in municipalities. She described one Bank of America control process that prevents fraud.

There being no additional speakers, Mayor Joe closed the Public Comments section.

Mayor Joe asked Finance Director Batt if he was aware of any instance of misuse of funds over the past six months; Finance Director Batt responded no.

MOTION: M/S Mahmud/Khubesrian to receive and file the report on financial policies. By roll call vote, the motion passed unanimously. Absent: None.

15. ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION AND APPROVAL OF A PROPOSED REORGANIZATION RESULTING IN SIGNIFICANT COST-SAVINGS BY ESTABLISHING A MANAGEMENT SERVICES DEPARTMENT THAT COMBINES THE CITY MANAGER'S AND CITY CLERK'S OFFICES

City Manager Gonzalez presented the staff report, accompanied by PowerPoint slides. He said with the proposed restructuring of the City Manager's and City Clerk's Offices, a savings of at least \$135,000 will be achieved in the upcoming fiscal year and one full-time position will be eliminated. He responded to City Councilmembers' questions.

Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud and Councilmember Cacciotti expressed concerns related to actual savings that could be achieved; whether the City Manager is undertaking too much responsibility with the reorganization; the inability to rescind the increases in salary if the reorganization does not work; and the fact that some of the duties were unclear in the job descriptions that were included in the staff report.

Discussion followed on the possibility of approving the reorganization recommendations but considering the job descriptions as “draft” until approved by the City Council. City Attorney Highsmith confirmed that recruitment could be undertaken with job descriptions that are pending final approval. She indicated support for Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud’s recommendations to emphasize the supervisory and management aspects of the three division manager positions of the proposed Management Services Department.

Mayor Joe opened the Public Comments section.

There being no speakers, Mayor Joe closed the Public Comments section.

MOTION: M/S Khubesrian/Cacciotti to: 1) Approve an amendment to the proposed operating budget for the City Manager’s and City Clerk’s Offices by combining the two offices into a Management Services Department; and 2) Adopt **Resolution No. 7400**, A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA, AUTHORIZING THE RECLASSIFICATION OF HUMAN RESOURCES MANAGER AND CHIEF DEPUTY CITY CLERK POSITIONS AND ESTABLISHING ASSISTANT TO THE CITY MANAGER POSITION AS UNREPRESENTED MANAGEMENT EMPLOYEES, PROVIDING FOR THE SALARIES AND BENEFITS, SUPERSEDING RESOLUTION NO. 7384. The City Council directed staff to return to the City Council in six months with a status report on the consolidation of the departments. An amendment was made by Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud and approved by the maker and seconder of the motion to direct staff to revise the subject job descriptions so they are accurate and fully developed, e.g., to clarify risk management responsibilities between the Chief Deputy City Clerk and the Human Resources Manager and to establish who has the ultimate responsibility for information/public engagement, whether it is the Assistant to the City Manager or the Chief Deputy City Clerk, and to revise the duties in a way that captures management responsibilities. By roll call vote, the motion passed unanimously. Absent: None.

ADJOURNMENT

Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Councilmember Khubesrian. Without objection, Mayor Joe adjourned the Joint City Council/Redevelopment Successor Agency/Public Financing Authority at 10:27 p.m.
